



European Research Council Advanced Grant

Plants fibres in timber, crops and food help us to live healthily and sustainably. Prof Paul Dupree, Dept of Biochemistry, University of Cambridge (WS 1976-84) has collaborated with father Prof Ray Dupree (Department of Physics, University of Warwick) and been awarded a European Research Council Advanced Grant EVOCATE. The Duprees have made significant advances in the understanding of the molecular architecture of plants and their project will allow the Cambridge and Warwick teams to study how the architecture of plant fibres changed over millions of years of evolution and to further develop solid state NMR for this research. The research could reduce the use of fossil fuels and plastics, replacing them with renewable and biodegradable alternatives.

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Reflections on a revisit to Warwick School



Jonty Izard (WS 1966-73)

Jonathan (Jonty) James Izard (WS 1966-73) kindly shared his reflections on his return to school this summer.

"I was apprehensive about visiting Warwick School and risking stirring up memories best forgotten. I'd arrived as a pupil in 1966, shy and nervous. I found my own clique of friends – surnames only, of course – and my own niche of subjects that I enjoyed or was not bad at (not always the same thing). I wasn't particularly happy or unhappy; more compliant and subdued. If you didn't excel academically or at sport you passed under the radar. And not conforming in terms of sexuality added to my desire to keep a low profile.

It wasn't until the Sixth Form that, determined to overcome my disabling shyness, I auditioned for the school play and an inspirational teacher saw talent in me that I wasn't aware of. His decision was instrumental in my emergence into a world that no longer scared me. I was out. I was off. After Cambridge I went to Bristol Old Vic drama school and became an actor. Then a journalist, broadcaster and psychotherapist. Nobody at Warwick could have predicted those plot twists.

On my visit to the school this spring so many memories flooded back: of chapel services, tuck shop treats, chilly swims in the outdoor pool, a teapot stand made in woodwork classes, a sneaky B&H in the red barn. Moments of frivolity, jealousy and teenage angst. Of being bullied but then joining the bullying gang. Of the boys in Lower 4A, whose names I can still recite in alphabetical order. And the teachers, most of whom probably scarcely registered me but the one who helped me change my life.

My apprehension evaporated within minutes of setting foot in the school again. I was fascinated to hear about the variety of opportunities available now, and the support offered for healthy growth to every pupil. And I was surprised and moved to feel something new stir in me about those old, familiar locations, the buildings and playing fields where I'd struggled but survived. It was a warm, comforting sensation. It was pride."

NASA Senior Scientist

For 50 years Dr Keith Ogilvie (WS 1939-43) worked for NASA as a senior scientist and astrophysicist, recruited in the exciting early days of the space programme. At NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center, he

was to play an important continuing scientific role until he retired at the age of 87 in 2012.

Keith participated in numerous space exploration missions at NASA, as Principal Investigator for experiments with instruments he designed; as Project Scientist; and as Laboratory Chief. His missions included Voyager I and II, International Sun Earth Explorer (ISEE) I and II, WIND (part of the Heliophysics Systems Observatory initiative) and DSCOVER (Deep Space Climate Observatory), a solar weather and earth climate observatory for which he was a key player in the conceptualization of its space science mission in 1999.

Keith received many awards. Chief among them were three medals: NASA Medal for Exceptional Service (1979), NASA Medal for Exceptional Scientific Achievement (1984), and "For lifelong service to the expansion of human knowledge of interplanetary space and the solar wind," NASA's highest civilian award, the NASA Medal for Distinguished Service (2009). He quietly revisited school during 2018 and had intended another visit in 2020 for he credited his academic and professional achievements to the solid foundation he received at Warwick School. With much regret, the visit was postponed because of the Pandemic and Keith passed away earlier this year.

The Mike Wardle Cup

James (WS 1997-2004) and Matt (WS 1989-96) Wardle returned to school to be photographed with the Wardle Cup – a swimming cup named in memory of their father Mike (WS 1950-60) who passed away earlier in the year.

An accomplished swimmer, Mike was one of Warwick School's swim coaches

for many years. He was instrumental in setting up the Warwick 100s which has become one of the premier school swimming competitions. In memory of Mike the school commissioned and renamed the trophy for Warwick 100s the Mike Wardle Cup.

In conversation with...

Nigel Robinson (WS 1955-66)

Nigel spent many happy and productive years at Warwick School. From an early age and throughout his life he has invested time and energy into forming and sustaining connections and friendships. School friendships have lasted a lifetime and for many years he has been the lynchpin and mainstay of the mid-1960s OW cohort, delivering regular communications with his inimitable humour and sharp wit.



Nigel started at Warwick School as a seven-year-old Junior House boarder with a trunk and metal tuck box. He recalls learning to make his own bed with hospital corners and a tight blanket, writing home on Sundays after chapel and being given 12 pennies pocket money (one of which had to reluctantly go in the Offertory plate). He fondly remembers iced buns, snowball fights and having hot chocolate while listening to matron Ros Wilson (née Pulford) read 101 Dalmations.

Nigel Robinson, WS 1955-66

His Warwick School education was interrupted in 1958 when, a week before his tenth birthday, he left for a three-year sojourn in Singapore when his father, 'HB', was posted there with the RAF.

His return to school at 13 years of age was a life changer. He reconnected and made lifelong friends. He enjoyed rugger, cricket and cross-country, was a drummer in the CCF corps of drums and, as captain of the school shooting team, was sergeant-in-charge of the armoury. A holder of the RLSS Bronze Cross and Award of Merit, he was also a qualified life-saving instructor... but admits he still can't swim that well.

Nigel's proud claim to fame is that he and David Summers were the first two Warwick School boys ever to complete the newlyintroduced Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award. Remarkably, the presentation of his Gold Award only took place recently, as he explained: "There was so much going on in the summer of 1966 – A level revision and exams, starting journalism and of course England winning the World Cup – that I left school without the Head Master ever signing my record book. In 2019 when I found the book in a box of memorabilia I passed it to the school who kindly signed it off and arranged for me to finally be presented with my badge and certificate!" Leaving school at 18 with A levels in English and economics & political studies, he toyed between a career in civil aviation, estate agency or journalism. While playing for the OWRFC during school holidays he was introduced in The Portcullis Club to ex-Fleet Street journalist and editor of the Warwick Advertiser Jim Pritchard (OWA President 1979), who offered him a three-year indentureship which launched his journalistic career. From the Warwick Advertiser he progressed through the Coventry Evening Telegraph, a stint in New York on the Reporter Dispatch and back home to join the Birmingham Post, before landing a three-year contract in Johannesburg on the Sunday Times. He looks back on an incredible and exciting time in South Africa.

Nigel loved journalism. He relished the company of journalists, the buzz of the newsroom, the rumbling of the press, clattering of typewriters and urgency of deadlines.

In the late 1970s he switched from journalism to pursue a career in public relations, launching his own agency, Newsline PR, in 1979, which he ran successfully until his retirement earlier this year. He looks back on a varied and exciting career with perhaps just one regret – that he didn't wait a little bit longer before switching from journalism to PR.



Looking at the Robinson family tree you will see Old Warwickians everywhere. Nigel's father 'HB' was head boy and captain of both rugby and cricket. After retiring from the RAF, he joined the Junior School where he became deputy head. Nigel's older brother Adrian also attended the school, and both went on to play for the OWRFC. His godfather was John Camkin (OWA President 1987) and four of his godsons are the sons of different OWs.

His children Sarah and Peter, from his previous marriage to Sue, were both christened in the school chapel; Sarah married there and her three children were christened there; and Nigel and Julie were married there. They celebrated their Silver Wedding Anniversary in May this year.

Nigel has always had great affection for Warwick School and is a staunch Old Warwickian. He has given a lifetime of service to both the school and OWA. He was social secretary of The Portcullis Club for many years before being elected its chairman in 1980. He served twice as OWA chairman (1985-87 and 2005-10) and was president in 2001. He was a playing member of the OWRFC in the 1960s and 70s and was elected its president in 2009. In 2014 he was appointed one of two OWA vice-presidents for the school's 1,100th anniversary year. He has also been secretary of the Old Warwickian Trust since its inception in 2011.

Nigel is unique. A friend to so many. A wise counsel to the Alumni Relations team. A provider of fun and laughter. A highly respected and treasured Old Warwickian.

Peter Johnston (WS 1948-55)



Air Niaer DC-6B Takeoff, Arlit, Niaer Republic

After a childhood flight in an Olley Airways de Havilland 'Dragon Rapide', Peter knew he wanted to be a pilot. His first lesson was in 1952, when he was just 15. He flew in the school holidays, beginning with 9 hours 25 minutes in his log book and ending his flying career with over 17,000 hours, many of them spent with the RAF, Air Ivoire with the DC-3, Orion Airways with the Boeing 737 and Brit Air with the ATR 42.

Peter gained his private pilot's licence in 1954 and, according to AHB Bishop, was the first Warwick School pupil to hold a flying licence while at school.

Peter's near misses include flying the Meteor T7 in 1960 when, in cloud at 8,000 ft, he suddenly saw a typical Boeing tail fin and was able to read the aircraft number, painted in ten inch high characters! He also recounts, from 1973, a tense story of engine failure on a regular flight from Abidjan to Korhogo.

His most memorable moment is an all-night flight from Birmingham to Palermo, Rome and Liverpool. Peter took off from Rome in the dark. "As we climbed away westwards the sun rose behind us. In front of us were towering black-centred cumulonimbus storm clouds tinged pink by the rising sun but periodically lit up by their own lightning flashes. Lines of small static electrical sparks would skid their way across the windscreens in front of us – a blazing tableau".

Mark's best memories of flying were his early days in Valencia, watching students learn the basics of flying and later progressing to flying large jets across the world.

While at Warwick School, he was told he'd never earn a living staring out of a window. Funnily enough, he feels as if he's never worked a day since his career began – he simply has a hobby which pays!

Maj Michael Pimm MBE (WS 1993-2000)



Michael completed his pilot training through the military flying training system as a junior officer in the Army Air Corps. Post Royal Military Academy Sandhurst, he started

the Army pilot's course with Elementary Flying Training on the Firefly light aircraft, Basic and Advanced Rotary Training on the Squirrel helicopter and finally, the Army's Operational Training Phase, also on the Squirrel helicopter. He was awarded the coveted Army Pilot Wings badge.

As a qualified Army pilot, Mike learnt to fly and operate the Lynx Mk7 helicopter with deployments in Iraq and Afghanistan. His most memorable flying moment was completing a flying exercise in Kenya which involved clearing elephants and giraffes from the training area.

Mike commanded 651 Sqn AAC in Northern Ireland, flying the Defender aircraft. He is currently flying a desk in Army HQ and hopes to return to the cockpit soon.

Patrick Tynes (WS 2005-12)





Patrick is a First Officer with Jet2, flying people on holiday predominantly around the Mediterranean and Canary Islands.

With a degree in Neuroscience he previously considered careers in neuroprosthetics or medicine but, after learning about first officer training programs, he rekindled a passion for flying (discovered through the WS RAF cadets gliding experience) and studied at Flight Training Europe Jerez. He got his foot in the door through Jet2's pilot apprentice scheme in 2018, which offered low-hour qualified pilots a Second Officer position on condition that they undertake a program which sees them spend time with all areas of the company including call centres, engineering and cabin crew, before starting on the Boeing 737-800.

While still at the beginning of his career in airlines, Patrick has plans to teach Crew Resource Management, which deals with the biological sciences of aviation, human factors in accidents and cooperation in a multi-crew environment. Outside of work, an ambitious bucket list of island-hopping, continent touring and bush flying is simmering for the distant future.

A special thank you to Andy Alsop MBE who began this threepart feature on OW pilots in The Old Warwickian by sending some amazing images and stories which we included in Issue 40. Over his career Andy spent over 22,000 hours flying, many of it as 'single pilot' and with the British Antarctic Survey. He flew professionally on all of earth's seven continents and all but one of earth's oceans (the latter from aircraft carriers, in float planes or from an iceberg or sea ice). He never managed to land on the Arctic Ocean and would have liked to have landed on the sea ice at the North Pole. He now spends his time gardening. His speciality is bamboos which hate wind and maritime exposure! Living in Orkney, this is quite a challenge.

Letters Home

Life as a Boarder at Warwick School, 1946-54

Thank you to many OWs who kindly donate items of school uniform, photographs, reports and other memorabilia which help preserve the history of Warwick School and contribute to our Archives. Several years ago, Godfrey Shiner (WS 1946-54) handed Warwick School the most extraordinary archive – all the circulars sent from school to home, all the play and concert programmes that he had performed in and, most importantly, all the letters that he (compulsorily) wrote home.



Godfrey's mother had filed all Godfrey's letters and stored them in her attic. In June 2022, he revisited school, to donate the letters, his straw boater and his father Philip's text books (after 95 years!). He gave us his permission to quote from the huge cache of nearly 200 letters, which give an unparalleled pupil view of life at Warwick School (and the Junior School) just after the Second World War.

We include some delicious excerpts here. Godfrey's spelling has been preserved, as has his very sparing use of the question mark.

Godfrey was one of nine Shiners who attended Warwick School, including elder brother Colin and younger brother Roy. The young Godfrey incessantly asked for things to be sent from home – things that he had forgotten, acquisitions like new Dinky toys – and especially food. Every one of his letters starts with the greeting: "Dear Mother and Father, I hope you are well." In the very first, dated January 12th 1946, when Godfrey was aged eight-and-a-half and had been at the school for one day, he goes on: The key of my tuck box is broken so I pretend to lock it. Will you give me one of those lockers like the one on bunnys hut, and will you send a screwdriver and a padlock and screws. I am having a good time. We are going to play football on Tesuday [sic] and Thursday. We have baths on Mondays Wednesday and Friday. I have nerly finsh all my food so will you send me some more tuck. With love from Godfrey.

A couple of weeks later, perhaps inevitably: *I am ill in the sick room.* When will you send me my fountain pen. Will you send me my tool set. (28/1/46). Godfrey soon recovered: Will you send me my stamp album and some stamp hinges. If you see any dinky toys for sale will you buy some for me... I have nothing else to say so good bye. Love from Godfrey. (9/2/46). On the third anniversary of D-Day, 6th June 1947, Field Marshall Montgomery inspected the Corps, and was guest of honour at Speech Day – awarding the school an extra holiday, which Godfrey discusses: On Monty's holiday we are allowed to go home like a free Sunday and will you phone Mr Cullis if I can come home for free Sunday and Monty's holiday. I can swim half a length now and dive a bit. (28/6/47).

The new school year sees 10-year-old Godfrey, now in form Slla with Mr Marshall, being given some responsibilities: *I am 2nd head of Junior house and I give out the letters for Matron. I have got lots of conkers could you send me some string and a bora [sic] for my conkers.* (25/9/47). There is now a hint of his future academic prowess, too: *I came top in maths every test.* (27/9/47).

A reminder of what boys used to put on their hair: *Could you send me my slippers and Brylcream*? (13/1/48).

Godfrey, aged 10-and-a-half, is busy on sports day and seems to notice the opposite sex: *I am in three things in the sports 100 yds, three legged and wheelbarrow and egg and spoon. There is a smashing girl sleeping in John's room and is a friend of Miss Wilford.* (6/3/48). He is, of course, forever hungry, too: *Could you bring the food for dorm feast next Saturday. I want four bottles of pop and some other grub.* (14/3/48).

Godfrey's letters become chatty in the summer of 1949. The fight mentioned is probably boxing coaching. Miss Wilford was, later, to become Mrs Thornton: Yesterday in a cricket match I got eleven runs. Miss Wilford let me go in the swimming yesterday to teach Roy to swim he can swim half a width. Yesterday I had another fight with Major Whitlam. A stand for the school telescope has been put on top of the main changing rooms. All the Upper fifths are allowed to were straw hats now and they look ever so funny. My ankle still hurts and I can't run properly. Trimble says I have probably chipped a bone. Nearly every Saturday morning I wreck my knee. Sid Cooper says he thinks the water is hard in the swimming baths because every time he does a belly flopper it hurts him.





In 1949 there was a dreadful accident in the chemistry laboratory in which chemistry master, Rev. H. E. Cullis, was seriously injured: *On Thursday afternoon in Chemistry we had an explosion it was about* 6 inches away from me. It blew me on the floor and half deafened me. And I got sulphuric acid over my clothes and face. I got cut by glass. If I had not been wearing glasses I would probably lost my eyes. Yesterday our school fifteen beat the O.W. club. I got a S. for form report. The explosion was heard all over the Science block. (23/10/49).

In the new school year of September 1950 Godfrey is in form LVa with Mr Adcock, and his first ever question mark appears: *Has my* badminton racquet come back yet? Do you think you could send me some money because I am very short. And could you get me some B.S.A. air rifle pellets. I am having my first music lesson on Tuesday but I have already started practicing. I think it would be a good idea if you sent me my old music books. We have started practising for the Opera and I am in the Chorus as a tenor. (1/10/50).

We now know the nature of his music lessons: Colin is bringing his tenor drum home at half-term and I am bringing my bugle. (6/4/51). The reason becomes clear: On Mayors Sunday some time next month the school band are going up to Warwick for a band demonstration. (29/4/51).

In 1951 Godfrey is still small for his age, and is at a disadvantage in rugby: Yesterday we played Henry VIII Coventry and we lost 14-3. They were much bigger than me. The ref was awful. They played rough and fould all the time so we decided to play rough and I ripped somebody's shirt and shorts. The pitch was less than 50 yards long. (21/10/51).

He was cast in a number of productions including Twelfth Night in 1952: We are having the dress rehearsal for the play today but I don't think the play will be finished for Thursday night. I have got some seats in row P that was the nearest to the front I could get... See you on Saturday night. (2.3.52).

Godfrey entered the sixth form in September 1952: *Its jolly expensive being in the sixth we have to buy exercise books. At the moment I am broke* (21/9/52). Godfrey's trumpet and bugle practice is now paying off: *Next week sometime we are going up to the Assizes to blow our bugles.* (16/11/52).

Godfrey must have confided something about a young King's High lady he met at the "social" to his parents: *Thank-you for lecture no.* 14, it is the first time that I have had one in a letter. I assure you that Valerie does not affect my work as I only see her on Sundays and it is one of my principles never to have any work on Sundays. I have just been out to Warwick looking for a junior who had run away. (8/2/53).

A couple of weeks after the Coronation Godfrey met Monty: Yesterday I went to the Royal Warwick's "at home" do, Monty was there and of course he was in a shabby old suit. I am 2nd bugler in the band and I've got a silver bugle. (14/6/53).

Sixteen-year-old Godfrey's last three letters from school to home convey a good deal of introspection about his abilities, and his future career. He entered the UVI, in form USVI, but decided to spend his last two terms at Warwick School living at home. There are no more letters home from school after November 1953. In the summer of 1954 Godfrey passed A-levels in chemistry, physics and maths and, aged just 17, went to Swansea Technical College to study for a National Diploma in Marine Engineering.

We wished Godfrey a very happy 85th birthday on 24 July 2022 and thank him most warmly for his co-operation with the writing of this article.


