OWA President Brig James Cook OBE (WS 1982-89) invites Old Warwickians and their spouses/partners to join him in the Indian Army Memorial Room at RMA Sandhurst on Saturday 13 April 2024.

The Indian Army Memorial Room (IAMR) was initially dedicated as a museum in 1950 to preserve the history of the British Indian Army. After the Indian Independence Act was passed and the British Indian Army disbanded in 1947, there was a call to preserve its heritage. Since its inception, the IAMR has also been a focal point for cadets at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst, upon both arrival and commission. The significance of the shared history between Great Britain and South Asia remains of great importance to their training, as well as their understanding of the role of the British Army today. Recently refurbished, the National Army Museum has reinvigorated the historic Indian Army Memorial Room with a new commemorative display with many previously unseen items from its collection.

Brig James Cook OBE (WS 1982-89)

James Cook was commissioned into the Royal Regiment of Artillery in 1995. Having spent most of his regimental duty in 29 Commando Regiment he commanded 105th Regiment Royal Artillery. Currently a Brigadier in the Army HQ, he is the head of personnel strategy. Outside of uniform life, he is the Chair of Army Rugby, a rugby referee, and a Board Member of the RFU.

In his spare time, James is Chair of Governors of John Hanson School in Andover and a keen road cyclist. James was appointed OBE for services to Army sports in 2016 and gained his Ph.D. from King's College London in 2020 on military transformation in the First World War.

James feels his successes in life are predominately down to the foundation Warwick School gave him, the excellence of the faculty, and the friends he made playing rugby. As such, he is delighted and proud to be the 2024 President of the OWA.

Sir Stephen Lovegrove KCB awarded GCMG

Sir Stephen Lovegrove KCB (WS 1978-95) has been appointed as a Knight Grand Cross in the Order of Saint Michael and Saint George (GCMG) for services to National Security.

Stephen was the UK Government's National Security Adviser until September 2022, previously serving as the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Defence. He has held several senior roles across Whitehall, including

Permanent Secretary for the Department for Energy and Climate Change, CEO of the Shareholder Executive (now UKGI), and was the UK Government's representative on the Board of the London Organising Committee of the Olympic Games and Paralympic Games.

One of Stephen's new roles is becoming Chair of Rolls-Royce SMR on 1 January. He is also a Carnegie Distinguished Visiting Fellow at Columbia University.

England cap for Fin Smith

It was wonderful to see Fin Smith (WS 2013-20) earn his first England cap in the Six Nations. Fin made his Premiership debut for Worcester in 2021 as an 18-year-old before becoming a regular starter in the team during the 2021-22 season. He joined Northampton Saints in October 2022 on a multi-year deal after Warriors went out of business.

Fin also features on a new documentary about Premiership Rugby for Amazon Prime.

Fin follows in the footsteps of other OWs who have gained international rugby caps. Tim Dalton (WS 1952-59) gained a full England cap in 1969 when he was on the winning side against Scotland at Twickenham. Marko Stanojevic (WS 1991-98) represented Italy in the 2007 RWC and 2009 Rugby Sevens Cup. Charlie Hayter (WS 2000-07) made his Commonwealth Games debut in Glasgow in 2014 before going on to represent England in 30 HSBC World Rugby Sevens Series rounds over five years.

Many OWs will also remember WS former staff Roger Hosen who played at full back for both England and the British Lions in the late 1960s.

Shillcock shines in win for Tigers

Six penalties and a conversion from fly-half Jamie Shillcock (WS 2004-15) secured a fantastic win for Leicester Tigers in their match against his old club Bath. The match went down to the wire until, with the clock on red, Jamie held his nerve with a decisive penalty kick and secured a 25-24 win for Tigers.

Jamie made his senior debut for Worcester Warriors as a 17-year-old while studying for his A levels and made almost 100 appearances for the club before a short stint with Bath Rugby in 2022 and then a move to Mitsubishi DynaBoars in Japan.

Fair Play

Fair Play, the latest film from producer and director Leopold Hughes (WS 1999-2006) debuted to rave reviews at the Sundance Film Festival and sold to Netflix for \$20 million. Fair Play's trailer begins on a happy note as a young couple explore their relationship which they're forced to keep secret from co-workers. A drastic change at work has dire consequences, shifting the dynamics and altering their personal lives. Alden Ehrenreich (Oppenheimer) and Phoebe Dynevor (Bridgerton) play the couple in the complicated, destructive relationship.

Three Wise Men





Physics Olympiad

This year's top physicists in Upper Sixth were amongst 3,137 pupils from 482 schools in the UK to participate in the annual Senior British Physics Olympiad competition, with ten securing a prestigious colour commendation from Bronze to Top Gold. The paper is extremely challenging and tests a range of student knowledge, preparation, ability, and problem-solving skills. Moreover, earning the Top Gold Certificate is very rare – awarded to just 5.9% of participants this year – a feat that two of our boys, Tom and Daniel, achieved.

An orchestra is a catalyst for inspiring creative energy within a community. These days, many children have few opportunities to learn an instrument and play music together. In response, Warwick Schools Foundation and its resident Orchestra of the Swan established the Swan Youth Orchestra in partnership with the Coventry, Warwickshire and Solihull Music Hubs. This February we celebrated the successful completion of the Youth Orchestra's inaugural weekend-long course. Sixty pupils aged 11 to 18 from over forty local schools – including ten boys from Warwick School – participated in the musical weekend which culminated in a concert to showcase their musical talent. All members of the Youth Orchestra are working at Grade 6 or above and benefit from the opportunity to learn from the professional Swan Orchestra and tutors from the three music hubs.

New war memorial

Members of the Warwick School community, including a number of OWs who served with the Armed Forces, attended the dedication of a new war memorial in Warwick School Chapel on Remembrance Sunday. In the decades since the World Wars ended, names have come to light of at least 13 Old Warwickians who lost their lives in the service of their country but whose names, for various reasons, were missing from the original WWI and WWII memorials in Chapel.

From the Archivist

Old Warwickian Rugby Internationals

There has been much discussion recently about who qualifies as the first OW who played rugby for Great Britain. There is now no doubt that it was Sidney Nelson Crowther, who was born in 1874 and attended Warwick School between 1887 and 1892. If the search is widened to who first played for their country, the winner is Crowther's near contemporary at Warwick School, Robert Challoner, who was born in 1872, who lived in Wellesbourne and who attended the school from 1885 to 1891. Challoner, by all accounts a stronger rugby player than Crowther, had emigrated to Australia, and played for that country in a match against Great Britain in Sydney in 1899. The Australians lost 11-0.

S N Crowther was the second of three brothers from Clapham Common to attend Warwick School as boarders in the 1880s and 1890s. In various accounts in Portcullis magazine he is called, therefore, "Crowther ii". He is first mentioned as a hockey player at the school in a tournament in February 1890, in which, in fact, all three Crowther brothers played. At Christmas 1890, S N Crowther was awarded a 5th Form history prize. In May 1891 we find him playing in the 1st XI cricket team, and it would seem that he acted as wicket-keeper. An analysis in Portcullis magazine shows that he played in 9 innings, and scored a total of 41 runs, in 1891. Challoner, the "excellent" captain of the same team, played 16 times, and scored a total of 168 runs. Crowther was described as someone who "takes the wicket with great pains without a murmur. A very plucky and useful bat". At this point he disappears from Portcullis magazine, although it is claimed that he left the school in 1892. At no point did he play for the 1st XV rugby team – he was too small.

S N Crowther went into business in London on leaving school, but then switched to the medical profession, joining the staff of Westminster Hospital in 1898. He served as a medic in the South African (Boer) War, and took a medical degree in 1903, being appointed as Senior House Physician at Westminster Hospital. He now took up rugby seriously, playing for hospital teams, and for Surrey, and was appointed as a member of the 1904 British touring side which played against Australian and New Zealand sides. He played in three test matches against Australia in July 1904 (the Great Britain side won all three) and the first ever such match against New Zealand, which the British side lost, in August 1904.

S N Crowther returned to England in 1905, and started to work in mental hospitals. At this time he gradually gave up rugby, and

switched to playing golf. At the outbreak of the First World War, he volunteered as a Motor Cycle Despatch Rider on behalf of the Royal Engineers. He left for the front on 12 September 1914, but was tragically killed by a shell on 18 October 1914, at L'Epinette, aged 39. He was the first Old Warwickian to be killed in the First World War, and his name is carved on the Memorial in the school chapel, as well as the Memorial at Le Touret in the Pas de Calais, France. He was buried in a garden at L'Epinette.

It had previously been thought that Tim Dalton, WS 1952-59, was the school's first rugby international and, indeed, his red velvet England cap is on permanent display in the Portcullis Room at school. He gained his first England cap in a match, coming on as a substitute, against Scotland in March 1969. This article in no way denigrates the memory of Dalton's achievement, which is rightly celebrated by many OWs, but is more in the way of putting the historical record straight.
