

### Tuesday "Through Hell for Hitler"

A few years ago **Henry Metelmann** [1922-2011]. spoke to the Sixth Form.



He was in the Wehrmacht during the Second World War and fought at Stalingrad.



He was captured on three occasions [by the Russians, the Americans and the British].


A POW in England at the end of the war, Henry returned and married a Swiss *au pair* whom he had met while he was a prisoner.

He worked for British Rail most of his life and then as a groundsman at Charterhouse School.

BBC Timewatch produced a documentary on him which is what made me invite him to the school.

It is based on his extraordinary memoirs: a signed copy of which is in the school library.



"He recounted an episode when the tank he was driving approached a group of Russian prisoners who were carrying a wounded comrade. On the approach of his tank, the injured man was left in the road. Metelmann stopped. His officer ordered him to carry on. "I had to run over the injured man and kill him. I became a murderer," he wrote. [Guardian obituary].



A peace activist in his later years, Henry told his story, not to shock, but to show how he became involved in dreadful and appalling atrocities.



"The feeling of guilt for what in a collective way I have done to others, especially the people of Russia, lies very heavily on me.

I have regrets for the suffering I have caused others, but no about what others have done to me." [Henry Metelmann].

However, fear not!

Olivia de Haviland who stars as Melanie Hamilton in Gone with the Wind is still with us at the age of 103.



She was born on 1<sup>st</sup> July 1916 – the first day of the Battle of the Somme.

Gone with the Wind *premiered* in Atlanta on December 15<sup>th</sup> 1939 soon after the fall of Poland.

Incidentally, the incomparable **Hattie McDaniel** was the first black woman to win an Oscar for her role as "Mammy" in the film. However, because of segregation, she was forbidden, as a black person, from attending the premiere.

That's worth knowing, but wouldn't be if the film was to be banned.



One of Olivia's co-stars, **Leslie Howard**, was killed in 1943 when his plane was shot down by the Luftwaffe as he returned from encouraging support for the Allied war effort in Spain and Portugal.

He may have been mistaken for Churchill by Nazi intelligence.




77 years later Olivia is still alive and living in Paris.



# **Tuesday Leamington Spa and the Nazis**

### **Operation Anthropoid**



In 1942, the Nazi architect of the Holocaust, **Reinhard Heydrich**, was murdered in Prague by Czech patriots. His car was riddled with bullets and a grenade exploded in it during an ambush in Prague. Heydrich was the only leading Nazi to be assassinated during the Second World War.

The Nazis though took a terrible revenge killing the civilian population of the Czech town, **Lidice**, in retaliation.



The attack was code-named **Operation Anthropid**. The Czech assassins who carried out the mission were **trained in Leamington Spa** before they were parachuted into Czechoslovakia. In 1968 **this monument** to Heydrich's killers was opened in the **Jephson Gardens**.

Restored in 2018, it depicts a parachute, the water streams are its strings and on either side is planted heather taken from the martyred town of Lidice.

Check it out next time you are in the Jephson Gardens – it is very close to the lake and few people know what it is commemorating.



In 2016 the film "Operation Anthropid" was made to tell the story of the assassins. This is the trailer for it. It looks pretty good.

### A Night at Warwick Castle

This incident is much less well-documented and I cannot find a movie about it.

But, having flown to Scotland in a stolen plane to open

negotiations with the British in 1941, Nazi Deputy Fuhrer, Rudolf Hess, was imprisoned for one night at Warwick Castle on his way to interrogation in London.

Sentenced to life imprisonment at the Nuremberg War crimes trial he was, for the last 17 years of his life, the only prisoner at Spandau prison in Berlin. He was found dead in 1987 at the age of 93.

Whether he was murdered or killed himself is still open to dispute.



#### **Not Amused**



Unlike Coventry, Leamington Spa did not endure anything like the same war-time bomb damage, although 13 civilians were killed in the town during Luftwaffe raids in 1940 and 1942.

During a 1940 raid a bomb exploded outside the Leamington Spatown hall **shaking but not stirring Queen Victoria**.

This is commemorated on the base of the statue proving that "Leamington can take it, Adolf!



#### **Conservative Prime Minister faces Flu Pandemic.**



Old Etonian Prime Minister, **Harold Macmillan** [1894-1986] faced a **1957 Asian Flu Pandemic** just a few months after taking office.

- Eventually 12 million were infected in the UK.
- 33,000 Britons died as a result of the illness.
- Globally 2 million died: 70,000 in the United States.
- At one point 110,000 children were off school in London.




Social Distancing, 1957

However government policy was to keep schools and the economy open.

Public events were also not cancelled although Sheffield Wednesday called off one match because their opponents, Manchester City, were unable to raise a team due to 'flu'.

A vaccine was developed relatively quickly and was being distributed on the NHS by the late summer.



When the Prime Minister felt ill himself he resorted to aspirin.

By the end of the year, the Flu pandemic had been virtually forgotten.

It is not mentioned in most History books of the period.

# Friday A Very Scary Ghost story writer


**MR James** was Vice-Chancellor of Cambridge University and then Provost of Eton.

Starring fading star, Dan Andrews, and an unconvincing demon it should have been terrible.



It is an extraordinary place, although the steps to the top can be daunting.






# Thursday The Mystery of the Lost Colony

In 1587, the first permanent English colony was established in North America.



At Roanoke Island in North Carolina.



Once the 115 settlers had established themselves, their leader, **John White**, returned to England in order to gather fresh supplies and advertise the success of the colony.

Before he left his grand-daughter, **Virginia Dare**, was born: the first English person to be born in the New World.

But the appearance of the **Spanish Armada** in **1588** changed everything.



Interest in the colony suddenly disappeared. There were more *pressing concerns*.

It was not until 1590 that John White returned.

There was no trace of the colony or the colonists.

Apart from the word "CRO" carved into a tree.



Which may have been short for the tribe "CROATON".

To this day nobody knows what happened to the first English settlers in the New World.

Were the colonists massacred by local tribes?



Were they wiped out by disease or starvation?

Did the group split?

Did they vainly try to return to England?

Or, having been abandoned by England, were they absorbed into mainland tribes?



So was "Croaton" [an Indian tribe] a last desperate sign-post to where they were heading?

Years later, in 1712, a British explorer, John Lawson, encountered a tribe who told him stories of their pale-skinned ancestors. . .


And recent archaeological evidence found on the mainland suggests this may indeed have been what happened.



The mystery though remains wide-open.

I read this book back in 1985.

It is still easily the study of what *may or* may not have happened at Roanoke Island.




## Friday The Right Path

Homelessness is something that many of us find really uncomfortable addressing and, even when we do, it is generally with acute embarrassment.



**The Salt Path** tells the story of Gaynor and Moth Winn who lose their home the same week as Moth is diagnosed with a terminal illness.



With nothing left to lose or do they decide to walk the 630 miles of the South-West coastal footpath.



The book is a wonderful celebration of the elements and a life-affirming acknowledgement that life looks different from a cliff path.



"Drawn to the edge, a strip of wilderness where we could be free to let the answers come, or not, to find a way of accepting life, our life, whatever that was". [Gaynor Winn, "The Salt Path"].



But it also makes you think a bit differently about the *story* behind *each individual* who ends up without a home.



Do read the book – it is wonderful.

And maybe walk the path?

### Monday The World's Worst Poem?

On 28<sup>th</sup> December 1879 the Tay Bridge collapsed during a violent storm.



taking it with a passenger train. There were no survivors.



William McGonagall [1825-1902]



commemorated the event with his "Tay Bridge Disaster".

It is generally regarded as his worst poem and, quite possibly, the worst poem in the English language, although his lines on the Official Opening of University College, Dundee [1883] are pretty dreadful too.

Good people of Dundee, your voices raise, And to Miss Baxter give great praise; Rejoice and sing and dance with glee, Because she has founded a college in Bonnie Dundee.

Anyhow this is the whole of his **Tay Bridge Disaster** poem.

I especially like the final four lines.

#### The Tay Bridge Disaster

Twas about seven o'clock at night, And the wind it blew with all its might, And the rain came pouring down, And the dark clouds seem'd to frown, And the Demon of the air seem'd to say-"I'll blow down the Bridge of Tay."

When the train left Edinburgh
The passengers' hearts were light and felt no sorrow,
But Boreas blew a terrific gale,
Which made their hearts for to quail,
And many of the passengers with fear did say"I hope God will send us safe across the Bridge of Tay."

But when the train came near to Wormit Bay, Boreas he did loud and angry bray, And shook the central girders of the Bridge of Tay On the last Sabbath day of 1879, Which will be remember'd for a very long time.

So the train sped on with all its might,
And Bonnie Dundee soon hove in sight,
And the passengers' hearts felt light,
Thinking they would enjoy themselves on the New Year,
With their friends at home they lov'd most dear,
And wish them all a happy New Year.

So the train mov'd slowly along the Bridge of Tay, Until it was about midway,

Then the central girders with a crash gave way,
And down went the train and passengers into the Tay!
The Storm Fiend did loudly bray,
Because ninety lives had been taken away,
On the last Sabbath day of 1879,
Which will be remember'd for a very long time.

As soon as the catastrophe came to be known
The alarm from mouth to mouth was blown,
And the cry rang out all o'er the town,
Good Heavens! the Tay Bridge is blown down,
And a passenger train from Edinburgh,
Which fill'd all the peoples hearts with sorrow,
And made them for to turn pale,
Because none of the passengers were sav'd to tell the tale
How the disaster happen'd on the last Sabbath day of 1879,
Which will be remember'd for a very long time.

It must have been an awful sight,
To witness in the dusky moonlight,
While the Storm Fiend did laugh, and angry did bray,
Along the Railway Bridge of the Silv'ry Tay,
Oh! ill-fated Bridge of the Silv'ry Tay,
I must now conclude my lay
By telling the world fearlessly without the least dismay,
That your central girders would not have given way,
At least many sensible men do say,
Had they been supported on each side with buttresses,
At least many sensible men confesses,
For the stronger we our houses do build,
The less chance we have of being killed.

### **Tuesday Letter from Leamington**

Speaking my audio-message into the computer on Thursday was much harder than I expected.

It is very difficult being conversational with a microphone.



It can be done though.

From **1946-2004** every Friday evening for 15 minutes the Blackpool-born BBC journalist **Alistair Cooke** [1908-2004] broadcast his "**Letter from America**" on Radio 4.



#### He covered everything:

Harry Truman's shock election victory in 1948, civil rights, Vietnam, the murders of JFK, Martin Luther King and Robert Kennedy, Watergate, the Reagan Revolution and the two Gulf Wars.

This is his radio broadcast on the assassination of President Kennedy in 1963:

"We may pray on our knees but when we get up from them we cry with the poet, *Do not go gentle into that good night.*Rage, rage against the dying of the light".

He gave his last – perfectly timed and presented broadcast at the age of 96 and died a few weeks later.

I recall listening to his report on 9/11 six years into my time at Warwick School.



This is how it began:

"I turned on a twenty-four-hour news station and saw a kind of movie I detest, of the towering inferno type: a roaring image, of a monolith collapsing like a concertina in a vast plume of smoke. Just as I pressed my thumb to switch to "the real world" I caught the familiar voice of a newsman and was in the real world of Tuesday, 11 September 2001, a date which to Americans will live in infamy along with the memories of Pearl Harbour, 7 December 1941, and 22 November 1963, the grievous day of President Kennedy's assassination".

But perhaps though his most famous broadcast was on the **Watergate Scandal** in **1974**.

When Cooke broadcast it was not yet clear whether President Richard Nixon would or would not resign over the cover-up of the break-in.



But the British public expected Cooke to be able to tell them.

He thus concluded his letter with the words:

"The rest you know . . . "

He was the consummate radio journalist.



And how wonderfully he would have reported Donald Trump's advice to inject disinfectant to combat Covid 19.



Good night.

Subversive, although much less surreal than Monty Python, it challenged the establishment but also parodied youth culture.

It was also very good at making fun of the *terribly earnest* TV shows Which your parents watched such as **Ask the Family, Tomorrow's World** and **That's Life**.

It was also consistently very funny.







**Hacker:** No one must ever be able to find it again! **Bernard:** In that case, Minister, I think it's best I file it.

It ran from 1980 -1988 and starred Paul Eddington as Jim Hacker, Nigel Hawthorne [born in Coventry in 1929]

as Sir Humphrey Appleby. And Derek Fowlds as Bernard Woolley.

Written by Anthony Jay [1930-2016] and Jonathan Lynn [1943-] the scripts are very clever and very funny.






He was *absolutely delightful* but said that he had been made very unhappy by the dreadful reviews that his Lear had been receiving.

Although it does have a big garden.





"King's Row". [1942].



And died in 1965 at the age of 91.



# Monday Bristol, Smethwick and the Oxford Union



The statue of Edward Colston in calmer times

I used to walk past this statue often in Bristol. I thought it was quite a nice, reflective, piece of sculpture.

The school my mother attended was named after Colston, as were many Bristol streets and a concert hall.





But in the last thirty years important questions began to be asked.

And matters came to a head a few days ago. When Colston's statue was thrown into the harbour.

Whether a crowd should pull down a statue is controversial.

And the past cannot always be ditched so easily.

Even the *recent history* of Bristol is inseparably connected with racism.

As late as **1963** the Bristol bus company refused to employ non-white drivers and conductors.



Which is seven years after **Rosa Parks** [1913-2005] protested against segregation in Montgomery, Alabama.



It was only after a campaign led by **Paul Stephenson OBE** [1937-] that the bar was lifted.



He was supported by local MP, **Tony Benn** [1925-2014].





I think there is a strong case for Stephenson having a statue.

Incidentally, things were no better in the Midlands.

In the 1964 General Election **Peter Griffiths** won Smethwick for the Conservatives on a **local** racist platform.





He also supported the council buying up homes on **Marshall Street** which would then only be rented to white people.

Although Griffiths lost Smethwick in 1964 he went onto become MP for Portsmouth North from 1979 until 1997.



He died in 2013.

So great was the controversy that **Malcom X** even visited Smethwick on 12<sup>th</sup> February 1965.

A few months earlier [December 3<sup>rd</sup> 1964] he had spoken at the **Oxford Union** supporting the motion:





Soon after, Edward Colston's toppling A clamour arose for Mr Gladstone [1809-1898] to be eradicated from the public consciousness.

As a young politician, Mr Gladstone was an extreme Tory whose first speech in the House of Commons was against the abolition of slavery.

"Rising home of stern and unbending Tories".


But, like John Bercow

Gladstone moved from the extreme right towards ardent liberalism.

And became the most radical Prime Minister of the Nineteenth Century.




He backed Home Rule for Ireland.

Objected to the expansion of the British Empire.

And was the first political leader to base foreign policy On the protection and expansion of **human rights**.

When he demanded Disraeli's government take action to stop the slaughter of Bulgarians in the Ottoman Empire.

Gladstone is still commemorated throughout Bulgaria.

You can ever stay at Gladstone apartments on Gladstone Street in Sofia.



When the Nazis tried to deport Jews from Bulgaria Bulgarians refused to co-operate.



Some even chanted "Gladstone, Gladstone".

As a result of this passive resistance most Bulgarian Jews survived the Holocaust.


And this is what Gladstone had to say about British intervention in Afghanistan [1878-1880]

"Remember the rights of the savage, as we call him.
Remember that the happiness of his humble home,
Remember that the sanctity of life in the hill
Villages of Afghanistan among the winter snows is as
Inviolable in the eyes of Almighty God as can be your own".



Gladstone last served as Prime Minister from 1892-1894,

And in his 80s he drew up plans for The construction of a residential library.



Which would encourage learning, study and friendly discourse.



At the core of the collection are still *Gladstone's own books.* 



He wheel-barrowed many of them there himself.

Until 2010 it was called St Deiniol's and only recently has been renamed the Gladstone

#### Library.



I have taken several school trips there.

Last time I discovered an 1880s book of recollections By a former slave.

I could tell it was one of Gladstone's own books as he had, characteristically, added his own index at the back.

And closely annotated it in his tiny and tidy hand-writing.

He had **underlined and double-ticked** the following sentence which the former slave had written:

"I believe that one day the equality of the black and white races will be recognized before God".

Gladstone once commented that

"No one ever became great except through many and great mistakes".



Interestingly, Gladstone had intended the Library to be called

#### "Monad"

The first number or entity signalling an all-encompassing universal truth.

So if the name of the Library changed to Monad I don't think Gladstone would mind that much.

He would prefer it.

But I wouldn't, myself, tear down his statues.

Because if we do decide to eliminate Gladstone from our History we may, perhaps, lose more than we gain.



## Wednesday Racist Abe?

Abraham Lincoln was born in 1809 [the same year as Gladstone]


But they were ships that passed in the night.

By today's standards there is no doubt that Lincoln was a racist.


His historical role is now being questioned.

This is what Lincoln had to say about black people in 1858 when he debated across Illinois against **Stephen A Douglas**. [1813-1861]

As they competed to be US Senator for Illinois.



"I will say then that I am not, nor ever have been, in favour of bringing about in any way the social and political equality of the white and black races, [applause]—that I am not nor ever have been in favour of making voters or jurors of negroes, nor of qualifying them to hold office, nor to intermarry with white people; and I will say in addition to this that there is a physical difference between the white and black races which I believe will forever forbid the two races living together on terms of social and political equality. And inasmuch as they cannot so live, while they do remain together there must be the position of superior and inferior, and I as much as any other man am in favour of having the superior position assigned to the white race".



Lincoln lost that race but won the Presidency in 1860.

He was the first Republican President.

In 1862 a delegation of former slaves met with

Mr Lincoln.

The meeting did not go well as well as this picture suggests.



Since Lincoln urged them to leave America At the earliest opportunity.

However, this is only part of the story.

Unlike many Americans Lincoln was unequivocal that slavery was wrong.

Lincoln also said this during his debates against Douglas.

"When Judge Douglas says that whoever, or whatever community, wants slaves, they have a right to have them, he is perfectly logical if there is nothing wrong in the institution; but if you admit that it is wrong, he cannot logically say that anybody has a right to do wrong".

On January 1<sup>st</sup> 1863 Lincoln freed all slaves in the rebellious states of the Union in his **Emancipation Proclamation**.




And towards the end of his life, Lincoln put all of his political energy into securing the passage of the **13**<sup>th</sup> **Amendment** through congress which would legally ban slavery throughout the Union.

This is what Steven Spielberg's **Lincoln** [2012] focuses on.

Certainly other Republicans, like **Thaddeus Stevens** [1792-1868] were prepared to go much further than Lincoln.



Whether they would have achieved as much is much more doubtful, as Stevens himself appreciated.

Lincoln's own moral convictions [like Gladstone's] were developing, too, and, had he not been assassinated at Ford's Theatre.





This is what **Frederick Douglass** [1817-1895] had to say about Lincoln in 1876.



"Viewed from the genuine abolition ground, Mr. Lincoln seemed tardy, cold, dull, and indifferent; but measuring him by the sentiment of his country, a sentiment he was bound as a statesman to consult, he was swift, zealous, radical, and determined".

So Lincoln was no Bobby Kennedy [1925-1968].



Such things really annoyed the British essayist and lexicographer **Dr Samuel Johnson** [1709-1784]



Who noted that

"How is it that we hear the loudest *yelps* for liberty among the drivers of negroes?"

Jefferson did though grant liberty to the six children of the slave **Sally Hemings** [1773-1835]



They were it now seems certain his children.

No one knows whether the relationship was consensual.

Jefferson also loathed the British

"I considered the British as our natural enemies and as the only nation on earth who wished us ill from the bottom of their souls". Which was not true of his great contemporary **John Adams** [1735-1826]



Which is probably why **George Washington** [1732-1799] appointed Adams as the first American ambassador to the United Kingdom.

Jefferson and Adams did, however, agree to take a **road trip** together in **1786**.



Mostly checking out English gardens.

"Edgehill and Worcester were curious and interesting to us, as scenes where freemen had fought for their rights.

All England should come in pilgrimage to this hill once a year.

Stratford upon Avon is interesting, as it is the scene of the birth, death, and sepulture of Shakespeare. Three doors from the inn is the house where he was born, as small and mean as you can conceive. They showed us an old wooden chair in the chimney corner where he sat. We cut off a chip according to custom.

[Adams' diary]

Jefferson went onto support the **French Revolution** [1789], even after it turned bloody.



And once noted that, "The tree of liberty must be refreshed from time to time with the blood of patriots and tyrants".

**John Kennedy** [**1917-1963**] thought that Jefferson was the most brilliant occupant ever of the White House



Commenting at one sparkling dinner that,

"I think this is the most extraordinary collection of talent, of human knowledge, that has ever been gathered at the White House - with the possible exception of when Thomas Jefferson dined alone".

Incredibly Both John Adams [US President, 1797-1801] and Thomas Jefferson [US President, 1801-1809] Died on the **same day**.

Which was 4 July 1826.

Exactly 50 years after the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

Just two weeks after the murder of Martin Luther King.

In **1975** Powell campaigned on the losing side in the **EEC referendum**, although predicting to an incredulous **Sir Robin Day** [1923-2000] the UK's eventual departure.

In 1986 Powell presented the prizes at Warwick School speech day.



In 2018 internationally-acclaimed florist **Simon Lycett OW** presented speech day and mentioned Powell coming to Warwick.



Mr Lycett was wonderful arranging flowers while he talked about how much he had disliked that particular speech day.

As a gay young man Warwick School had not been easy for him.

While he remembered that his numerous failures at O Level had almost become a personal affront to his Maths teacher.

The only Speech Day to compare in my recollection was when **Matthew Parris** advised the boys that:



"If at first you don't succeed for goodness sake try something else that you might be good at"

Incidentally, Powell's speech in 1986 focused On the importance of a classical education.

Afterwards, **Mr Frykman** [the school archivist] asked Mr Powell if it was true that he had once said that wearing woollen underpants was the best way of keeping cool in a warm climate.



Mr Powell earnestly said that this was *indeed true*.

Something to do with creating an overall ambient body temperature.

Some years later, to prove his hypothesis, Powell went walking in the Spanish foothills in the height of summer.

Fully attired.



He collapsed from heat exhaustion and was ambulanced home.

Enoch Powell is buried at St Mary's Church Cemetery and there is a small plaque within the church.

It is in the regimental chapel of the Warwickshire Regiment which Powell joined as a private soldier in 1939.



A few years ago a fellow dog-walker, hearing that I taught at Warwick School, mentioned that he had been the policeman on duty at the **Guy Nelson Hall** when Powell spoke.

Some months later he found this photo of him with Enoch Powell and Headmaster, John Strover.

You should all now be aware of the **Benfield-Whittaker Environmental Essay Competition**.

It is named for **Tony Whittaker** and **Michael Benfield** Warwick School boys, who went onto establish the **PEOPLE PARTY** in 1973.

This was the first UK political party with a *purely environmental focus*.

Tony was a Coventry lawyer and former Conservative councillor in Kenilworth and Michael ran a business in Coventry.

Tony died in 2016 aged 83.



The idea of forming an environmental party came to the two Old Warwickians at the **Bridge Inn** in **Napton**.



**PEOPLE** then became the **Ecology Party** 



And eventually the **Green Party**.



Tony was the party's first chairman

He and his family moved from Coventry to Exmoor in the 1970s where they became self-sufficient.

A bit like Tom and Barbara in The Good Life.

In the **1979 General Election** Tony stood for the Ecology Party in North Devon where the local Liberal MP and former Liberal leader **Jeremy Thorpe** 



Was about to stand trial for conspiracy to murder **Norman Scott**.



Who survived and now lives on Dartmoor.

Tony won just 729 votes, but at least he got more than the journalist **Auberon Waugh** 



Who won only 79 for the **Dog Lover's Party**.



After a Great Dane, **Rinka**, was caught up in the alleged conspiracy and shot.

**Sir George Catlin** [1896-1979] was a leading political scientist of the Twentieth Century.



He was only briefly a pupil at Warwick School, going onto St Paul's School in London.

But his happiest memories were of Warwick School before the Great War in which he served on the Western Front.



He taught at Cornell University, was an early supporter of Independence for India and *even* worked for a Union of the United Kingdom and the United States.


In **1966** became President of the **Old Warwickian Association**.



In 1925, he married Vera Brittan



Whose autobiography



Is one of the most powerful and haunting memoirs of the First World War.

Written in 1933, it tells the story of Vera's wartime service as a nurse and the deaths of both her fiancé, **Roland Leighton** [1895-1915]



And her brother, **Edward Brittain**. [1895-1918]



"There seemed to be nothing left in the world, for I felt that Roland had taken with him all my future and Edward all my past."

Their daughter, **Shirley Williams** [1930-] was greatly influenced by her parents' idealism.

And then served as leader of the **Liberal Democrats** in the House of Lords.



In 2016 she retired from the House of Lords saying that she wanted people to say

"Why is she retiring?"

Rather than wait and hear them saying

"Why isn't she retiring?"

As well as siring 15 children he also found the time to compose **Onward Christian Soldiers**.



Sung here by Gospel singer and civil rights activist **Mahalia Jackson** [1911-1972].





Fred Mulley [1918-1995] is one of the most notable and successful Old Warwickians

Serving as Secretary of State for Education

and then Defence in the 1970s.

However, sadly, if he is remembered at all it is for *just one thing*.



Which is for falling asleep next to the Queen at an RAF review in 1977.



Her Royal Highness was not amused



And one satirical magazine



went so far as to suggest that Mulley should be executed for treason for having slept with the monarch. After the embarrassing incident having a nap while on duty became known in the RAF as

"Having a Fred Mulley".



Most History books miss Fred Mulley out and when he is mentioned they *have* 

"Nothing to say".

"There were an awful lot of grey men in Callaghan's government: even at the time, few voters could have

picked out **Fred Mulley**, David Ennals, Albert Booth or Bruce Millan". [p465]

Poor Fred simply could not compare with the notorious drinker and accident-prone Foreign Secretary **George Brown** [1914-1985] who once mistook the Archbishop of Lima for a woman and asked him for a dance.



Or Education Secretary, **Anthony Crosland** [1918-1977], being rude to absolutely everyone.



And threatening to do **really dreadful things** to Grammar Schools.

However Fred Mulley is much more interesting than all of this suggests.

Even inspiring.

Fred came from a family of labourers in Leamington Spa.

"They believed passionately in education and scraped to send him to a church school and then to Warwick School".

[Fred Mulley's obituary,1995]

Where Fred became Chairman of the

**League of Nations Union** *and* a member of the **Officer Training Corps**.



And would have had the opportunity to swim in the open air pool which existed from 1911-1993.



Fred's political ambitions were also fostered by the fact that the glamorous local MP was the future Prime Minister, **Sir Anthony Eden** [1897-1977].



Whose memory still lingers in this barber shop at 97 Clarendon Street, Leamington Spa.



Where you will soon be able to have your hair cut again.

In 1939, Fred joined the Worcestershire regiment.

Sent to France, he was part of the covering operation enabling as many troops to leave **Dunkirk** as possible.



Which is brilliantly reimagined in Christopher Nolan's extraordinary **Dunkirk** [2017]

Taken prisoner Fred was imprisoned at **Stalag 383** near Regensburg.



Where Fred encouraged another prisoner, **Terry Frost** [1915-2003], who was also from Leamington Spa, to carry on with his painting.

Terry went onto be one of the most celebrated surrealist artists of the post war period.



And was knighted in 1998 for his contribution to British art.

On Fred's death the irrepressible Labour warhorse **Denis Healey** [1917-2015]

Who did not suffer fools gladly.



remembered that,

"I came to know Fred Mulley as soon as he entered the House of Commons because Terry Frost had told me of Fred's generosity in helping him to get started as a painter when the war ended - after they had been together in a prisoner-of-war camp in Germany.

Fred gave him a slice of his grant.
That generosity was typical of the man."

#### Fred, of course, never mentioned this to anyone.

Another Labour MP, **Tam Dalyell** [1932-2017] summed up Fred in this way.



"Fred Mulley was one of the most self-effacing, yet effective, cabinet ministers, who throughout a long period of high office remained precisely what he always was – a considerate, helpful, extremely intelligent and thoroughly decent human being, devoid of airs and graces, pomp and circumstance".

"The solution was what mattered to Mulley – not who got the credit".

So Fred Mulley maybe **you** deserve a statue?



Although somehow I don't think you would want one really.

# Monday The Brothers

Paul Oppenheimer MBE first spoke at Warwick School on November 10<sup>th</sup> 1998.



This was the **60**<sup>th</sup> **anniversary** of **Kristallnacht** [The Night of the Broken Glass] when Jewish shops across the Reich were destroyed and many Jews murdered.

His story was devastating but also inspiring.

Paul and his brother, Rudi, and sister, Eva were all born in Berlin.

Their parents were Jewish.



Realizing how great the Nazi threat to them was Mrs Oppenheimer managed to get the children to England.

Where they stayed with their uncle and aunt.



But Mr Oppenheimer did not get the visa he needed to reach the UK.

And the family reunited in **Amsterdam**. where they believed they would be safe.



Since the Netherlands had been neutral in the First World War.

But on **10 May 1940** the Nazis invaded the Netherlands.



And the Oppenheimers were once again under Nazi rule.

During the Nazi occupation the children attended the same school as **Anne Frank** [1929-1945]



Whose father, like Mr Oppenheimer, had moved his family to the Netherlands for safety.

But Paul did not remember her, because as he used to say, he did not then play much with girls.

Forced to wear the yellow star, the Oppenheimers were evicted from their home and sent to the Amsterdam ghetto.



And from there to **Westerbork** transit camp where most Jews, like their four grand-parents, were then sent to the gas chambers



But, Eve had been born in England and so held a British passport and therefore the family were sent to **Bergen Belsen** as *Exchange Jews*.

Although Jews were not gassed at Bergen Belsen conditions were horrific.



Just before the camp was liberated Mr and Mrs Oppenheimer died of typhus

As did Anne Frank.

And the orphaned Oppenheimer children were loaded onto the last train out of Belsen to be used as potential hostages.

Days later British troops liberated Bergen Belsen.



The future actor, **Dirk Bogarde** [1921-1999]



was one of the first inside the camp. This is what he remembered.

## Patrick Gordon Walker [1907-1980]



who you may recall from previous posts lost his seat in **Smethwick** in the 1964 General Election as a result of race hatred

Also helped liberate the camp.

It was unforgettable.

This is the group outside the Oppenheimers' home in **Heemstede** which Paul and Rudi had not visited since 1941.



Which, incidentally, is twinned with Leamington Spa.

Over the years, Paul became a great friend to the school.

One special evening he enjoyed telling his story to Warwick School parent **Sir Ben Kingsley** whose portrayal of **Itzhak Stern** [1901-1969] in **Schindler's List** [1994] had been one of the reasons Paul had decided to begin telling his own family's story.

Paul died in 2007. He spoke at the school just a few weeks before his death. In his last few months alive he had begun to receive anti-Semitic letters trying to make him stop telling his story.

Even though he knew he was dying, this made him carry on right until the end because he knew, he explained to me, that *he had to*.

## Tuesday A Nazi called Colin

Since 1995 I have attended hundreds and hundreds of Wednesday assemblies.



School assembly in what is now the Pyne Room.

First in the Guy Nelson Hall.

Named after **Guy Nelson** who was chairman of the Governors from 1938-1963.

And who played cricket for Warwickshire in 1920 and 1921.



And more recently the Warwick Hall.



The one I remember most of all was in 2009 when the Headmaster, **Mr Edward Halse**, [2002-2013]



Pictured here with Lord Coe.

## Spoke about Colin Jordan OW.

The *easy thing* to do would have been to ignore Jordan who had just died.



But Mr Halse felt that it was important to acknowledge that Jordan had been an OW so that our complacency in the face of racism could be confronted.

Jordan was a boy at Warwick School a few years before Fred Mulley.

Like Fred he was enthusiastic about politics.

However, unlike Fred he was a racist.

In 1960, Jordan was one of the founders of the **British National Party**.



But broke with the party because he did not think it was *sufficiently Nazi*.

Jordan went onto found the **British National Socialist Movement** in **1962**.

Then at the **Nazi world conference** held in **Guiting Power** in Gloucestershire in **1962**.



Jordan was declared **World Führer**.

With the American Holocaust denier **George Rockwell** as his Deputy.



In 1963 Jordan married **Françoise Dior**, niece of fashion designer Christian Dior and Catherine Dior who had been deported by the Gestapo to Ravensbruck concentration camp because of her work for the Resistance.



The marriage ceremony took place in **Coventry**.

That Nazi propaganda minister, **Joseph Goebbels**.



Invented the term coventriert Meaning to totally destroy something.

In 1965, **Patrick Gordon Walker**, who had helped liberate Bergen Belsen

And lost his seat in Smethwick against the racist **Peter Griffiths** in the 1964 General Election.



Contested a by election at **Leyton**.

Gordon Walker was confident that he would win.

In the February 1974 General Election the racist National Front won 0.2% of the popular vote.



And in the 1979 General Election 0.6% of the vote.

But by then Jordan's career was over after he was arrested *shoplifting* from

## Tesco in Leamington Spa.



The historian **Dominic Sandbrook** takes up the story.



"The far right leaders were hardly the best and the brightest. Colin Jordan, the founder of the anti-Semitic British Movement, did have a second-class history degree from Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge. But the former Coventry maths teacher's ambitions to become Britain's answer to Adolf Hitler were cruelly frustrated when in May 1975, he was convicted of stealing "a box of chocolates and three pairs of red women's knickers" from a branch of Tesco in Leamington Spa. As even the most faithful Nazi would have to admit, this was hardly the behaviour of a future Führer.

State of Emergency, 2010.

In his later years Jordan continued to express the most **obscene racist views**, but because of his age the decision was taken not to prosecute him.

In 2009, the year he died, two members of the BNP were elected to the European Union Parliament.

**Andrew Brons** became a BNP MEP for Yorkshire and the Humber with **9.8%** of the popular vote.

And **Nick Griffith** became MEP for North West England with **8%** of the popular vote.



Nationally the BNP achieved **6.2%** of the vote in this election

And 8.6% in the West Midlands

A year after Jordan's death in the 2010 General Election the **BNP** won **1.9%** of the popular vote.

Although, in the 2019 General Election the BNP won just 510 votes.

But its activists are hoping that the pandemic will encourage support for their racist ideology.

So be aware that people like Colin Jordan do exist.

And that they thrive on our indifference.

## Wednesday Hungry Face

Peter Strickland lived from 1869 to 1951.



Educated at Warwick School, he must have been one of the first boys to attend the school when it moved to its new site on the Myton Road in 1879.



The school's modern science laboratories would have been particularly exciting.



Today this is downstairs in the Music Department

In 1888, Peter Strickland was commissioned into the **Norfolk Regiment** and for the rest of his life served in the British military.

His experiences were certainly varied.

Like Winston Churchill [1874-1965].



Strickland served at the Battle of Omdurman in 1898.



Where the British losses were **48 killed** compared to an estimated **12,000 Mahdists killed**.



And the last cavalry charge of the British Empire took place.

In the **First World War** Strickland commanded the **Jullunder Brigade** which comprised:

The First Manchesters
The 47<sup>th</sup> Sikh Regiment
The Scinde Rifles Regiment which recruited from amongst
Sikhs, Hindus and Muslims.

"The three different battalions were formed from different countries, with different cultures and beliefs.
Yet they would form friendships and comradery which would see them through what was to come".

**Jullunder Brigade Association** 



"After the fierce fighting in Givenchy the Battalion was paraded and was heartily congratulated on their splendid achievements in the battle by General Willcocks who stated "I want to tell Colonel Strickland in front of you all what I think of him. He is a first class soldier and you are a brave lot of men".

**Jullunder Brigade Association** 

The Jullunder Brigade went onto fight at the battle of **Neuve Chapelle** [March 1915] where **7000 British** and **4200 Indian soldiers** were killed.

Where the Germans deployed poison gas in large quantities for the first time.

Strickland subsequently took command of the First Infantry Division leading it during the Battle of the Somme [1916].

When on the first day alone [1 July 1916] **20,000 British were killed**.



In **August 1916** footage of the battle was made into a wartime documentary.

For propaganda purposes.

**20 million British people** watched it at cinemas in the first six weeks.



It is very powerful even today.

At the end of the First World War, Strickland was sent to **Ireland** to help crush the independence movement.



As commander of the **6**<sup>th</sup> **Division** he was a major IRA target and in 1920 a plot was hatched to ambush his military convoy.

The ambush took place but Strickland had decided not to travel with that particular convoy.



In his place **General Cumming** was targeted and shot dead.

For example, during the Irish insurgency, British troops serving with Strickland burned down large parts of **Cork** in retaliation for IRA attacks.



But Strickland also understood the importance of good intelligence and kept highly detailed records of Sinn Fein / IRA suspects.

When the IRA offered not to shoot a hostage,

the loyalist **Maria Lindsay**, if Strickland treated the IRA prisoners he had taken as POWS, Strickland refused to negotiate.

And Maria Lindsay was killed.



# **Appendix 2 Dr Chapman's Guest Celebrity Post**

Like many of you, inspired by Mr Jefferies' film recommendation, I have turned to my DVD stack for some light relief in the lockdown. With over 250 DVDs occupying the shelves (and that is only the films and not the TV box sets), you can see that providing a few recommendations from my collection may be tricky. So for today I focus on just one genre – the spy movie. And although I am a great lover of the all action block busters of the James Bond/Mission Impossible/Jason Bourne franchises for example, I want to focus on a just a few of the more hard hitting, often true, stories of espionage, deception and double agents.

So here are a few to get you going:

#### **Recent Releases**

Most recently these two films accurately recount the real events of two female spies.



Official Secrets tells the story of the GCHQ whistle-blower Katharine Gun who leaks a memo from the NSA with the United States enlisting Britain's help in collecting compromising information on U.N. Security Council members to blackmail them into voting for war against Iraq in 2003. Brilliant explores the legality of Tony Blair's decision to go war with Ralph Fiennes leading the charge as defence lawyer.



Red Joan – the 'Granny Spy' as she was dubbed played by Judi Dench. It is story of Joan Stanley a widow living out a quiet retirement in the suburbs when, shockingly, the British Secret Service places her under arrest. The charge: providing classified scientific information - including details on the building of the atomic bomb - to the Soviet government for decades. The action swaps between present and Cambridge from 1944 onwards. Gives a very clear insight into how the soviets set up their double agents into the British Secret Service post war.

#### **Cold War Factual**

For those of you interested in the division of east and West Germany and in particular the events leading to the construction of the Berlin Wall then recently my favourite has to be this:





The film is the story of lawyer James B. Donovan (played by tom Hanks), who is entrusted with negotiating the release of Francis Gary Powers—a U.S. Air Force pilot whose U-2 spy plane was shot down over the Soviet Union in 1960—in exchange for Rudolf Abel (brilliantly portrayed by Mark Rylance), a convicted Soviet KGB spy held under the custody of the United States, whom he represented at trial. The name of the film refers to the Glienicke Bridge, which connects Potsdam with Berlin, where the prisoner exchange took place. The background of the days of division of Berlin adds to the drama and gives a real feel as to what it was like to be in Berlin as the Wall went up almost literally overnight.

## **Fictional Spy Movies**

I end with two of my favourite fictional spy offerings. The first is little known but is brilliantly acted with a host of big names and touches upon some of the themes of cover up, political interest and the like that most recently the Blair government were accused of. The secret service v the government in a big way:








Called the Worricker Trilogy, each of these films staying with Page 8 is a full feature length story — all linked to each other. Bill Nighy is at his sardonic best as Johnny Worricker the long-serving MI5 officer. Also starring Michael Gambon Judy Davis and Rachel Weiss the trilogy begins with a seemingly innocuous comment at the foot of page eight of a document alleging that the Prime Minister (played by Ralph Fiennes) has knowledge of secret overseas prisons where terror suspects have been tortured by American authorities. As the PM did not share any intelligence gained with the security services, it has endangered a number of British lives. Following an intricate and brilliantly written plot the trilogy progresses to a showdown between Nighy and Fiennes which as a piece of political satirical repartee rivals the script writing of any drama.

#### My Favourite

For my final choice (and my favourite) I confess I have moved from the film DVD shelves to those of the TV series. While this particular series was dramatized into a very watchable film starring Gary Oldman and Colin Firth in 2011, I still think the 1979 BBC series is the definitive adaption:



Why would I whole-heartedly recommend you return to this drama now 41 years old? Here are just a few reasons:

- It remains one of the most accurate adaptations of a novel by any film or TV series in some cases the screenplay is word for word what is written in the book.
- John le Carre wrote the book in 1974 in the height of Cold War and when double agents and espionage were rife.
- John le Carre (real name Davd Cornwell) was himself a spy in the 1950s and 1960s before becoming a full time author. He knew what he was writing about! He went on to write many more novels which have been successfully adapted Smiley's People was also adapted with the same cast (more or less) by BBC (although I have always thought it sad that BBC didn't adapt the middle book of the trilogy, The Honourable Schoolboy) and many of you will have watched the modern adaptation of The Night Manager a couple of years ago.
- He wrote Tinker Taylor very much based on the secret service of the 1960s and 70s. He used
  his experience of the unmasking of notorious double agents like Ken Philby and the other
  'Cambridge Spies' to inform the plot line of a high ranking double-agent in the secret service
   – a 'mole' to be flushed out by George Smiley. The TV series recorded only a few years after the book publication really does show what it was like in heart of the secret service in the
  Cold War.
- The cast is stella the chief protagonist George Smiley is played by Sir Alec Guinness who showed his versatility as an actor when in later years was not only portraying spies but as the same time starring as Obi-Wan Kenobi in the original Star Wars trilogy. Supported by household names such as Ian Richardson and Bernard Hepton this was a BBC 'all-star cast' of the time.
- But perhaps the real reason I like this so much is that le Carre has said that when he wrote
  the book and advised on the screen play of the film he had in mind the real-life character of
  Maurice Oldfield who became head of the secret service in the 1970s. It is no coincidence
  that Alec Guinness' character looks very similar on screen to Maurice Oldfield himself spot
  the difference:
